Programme and Important Information

Welcome to EPC4, and Welcome to UCL!

We are delighted to host the Fourth European Pragmatism Conference. Here you will find the Conference Programme and some important information about the sessions and how they will run.

The conference is organised in four-speakers sessions (except for the afternoon of Friday 5 August). Each presenter should budget 30 minutes for their presentation, followed by 15 minutes of questions, for a total of 45 minutes per paper. Please make sure you stay within your allocated time, as we have a very packed schedule and cannot over-run. Chairs will be instructed to cut-off speakers and questions at 45minutes on the dot.

Each session will have a coffee break half-way through, after the first two papers. Times for the coffee breaks are listed on the programme, at the top of each session. The coffee breaks will be located in the UCL North Cloisters (and on the adjacent terrace, British weather permitting!).

The conference starts at 9.00am on Wednesday 3 August. Please check-in by 9am at the registration desk in the North Cloisters. The easiest way to access the North Cloisters is via the main UCL entrance in Gower Street. See the maps at the end of the programme for details.

IMPORTANT NOTE (1): UCL has the advantage of being located in the very centre of London, but this comes at a price: to ensure large rooms for our conference we had to book lecture theatres in various buildings in the UCL main campus. Please budget 5-7 minutes to walk from the coffee area (North Cloisters) to the rooms located in the Darwin Building and Roberts Building. The Jeremy Bentham Room is in the Wilkins Building, by the North Cloisters.

IMPORTANT NOTE (2): Every lecture theatre has a pc and a projector. Please save your presentations online or on a memory stick, as not all rooms have the correct cables to connect your laptops (mac users are especially disadvantaged, as UCL does not provide mac connectors – sorry!). Please save your presentation either in PowerPoint or in PDF. Both formats read well on UCL-managed computers.




